

135 POLICEMEN TESTIFY

Entire Force in Bayonne to Be Called in Rogers Trial

JERSEY CITY, Nov. 28.—Police vans and radio patrol cars were mustered into "emergency service" today to transport 135 policemen from Bayonne Police Headquarters to the Hudson County Court House here to testify at the Special Sessions trial of George W. Rogers, radio operator of the burned steamship Morro Castle and former Bayonne patrolman, who is charged with attempting to kill his superior officer, Lieutenant Vincent J. Doyle, with a home-made bomb.

Forty other policemen testified last week and thirty more will testify tomorrow. All the police witnesses were asked if they had written the anonymous note that accompanied the fish-tank heater containing the bomb. All denied they had done so.

Arrangements for producing the policemen had to be made according to the shifts on which they worked. Rogers may take the stand today after the State rests its case.
